Key qualities employers value

- Clinical competence and safety awareness
- Strong communication and patient interaction
- Adaptability in fast-paced environments
- Team collaboration
- Professionalism and reliability

CV vs. résumé in healthcare

- A healthcare CV is more comprehensive than a résumé
- It includes:
 - Academic history
 - Clinical rotations
 - Certifications
 - Research or projects

Structure and Format Basics for a New Grad Healthcare CV

A clear structure ensures your new grad healthcare CV is easy to read and professionally presented.

Formatting tips

- Keep your healthcare CV to 1–2 pages
- Use consistent headings and spacing
- Avoid excessive colors or graphics

AI-ready healthcare CVs

- Use consistent job titles, dates, and bullet structures
- Use clear section headings and standard labels
- Incorporate role-specific healthcare keywords from the job description

Header and Contact Information

- Full name and credentials (e.g., BSN, DPT)
- Phone number and professional email
- Optional: LinkedIn profile

Professional Summary

- 2–4 concise sentences
- Highlight:
 - Clinical interests
 - Core strengths
 - Career goals

Education

- Degree(s) and institution(s)
- Graduation date
- Relevant coursework
- Honors or distinctions

Clinical Rotations or Practicums

- Facility name and location
- Patient population
- Key responsibilities and skills

Licensure and Certifications

- State licensure (or pending status)
- Certifications (e.g., BLS, ACLS)
- Note multi-state eligibility if applicable

Skills Section

- Technical skills:
 - Electronic health records (EHR)
 - Patient assessment skills
- Soft skills:
 - Communication
 - Critical thinking

Professional Affiliations and Volunteer Work

- Memberships and associations in healthcare organizations
- Volunteer clinical or community service

References

- List references on a separate page or state "References available upon request" to keep the healthcare CV concise
- Include full professional details for each reference—name, clinical or administrative title, organization, phone number, and professional email

How to Emphasize Strengths Without Extensive Experience

One of the biggest challenges in building a new grad healthcare CV is limited experience, but you likely have more relevant experience than you think.

Focus on clinical rotations

- Treat them as real experience
- Include measurable details:
 - "Assisted with care for 10+ patients daily"
 - "Documented patient data in EHR systems"

Highlight academic work

- Care plans
- Case studies
- Research projects

Showcase transferable skills

- Time management
- Leadership in group projects
- Patient communication

Use strong action verbs

Instead of:

- "Responsible for patient care"

Use:

- "Delivered patient care to diverse populations"
- "Collaborated with interdisciplinary teams"

These strategies are key when mastering how to write a healthcare CV that feels impactful despite limited work history.

Tailoring Your Healthcare CV for Each Job Application

A generic new grad healthcare CV rarely stands out. Customization is essential. How to tailor effectively:

Analyze the job description

- Identify keywords and required skills
- Look for repeated phrases

Mirror employer language

- If a posting says "patient-centered care," use that phrase
- Helps with applicant tracking systems (ATS) that are often used to identify key phrases or skills that were referenced in the job description

Adjust your CV accordingly

- Update your professional summary
- Reorder skills based on relevance

Benefits of tailoring

- Improves keyword matching
- Increases chances of passing ATS filters
- Shows genuine interest in the role

What truly sets a CV apart is demonstrating an understanding of the full scope of patient-centered care."
